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Identification:

- Medium sized hawk. Males are about 39 cm in length, whereas females are about 45 cm
- Males often brighter than females
- Dark blue-gray crown with lighter nape
- White tipped, rounded tail with bands of brown and blue-gray
- Back and upper wing coverts are brown or blue-gray
- Adults with robin's red barring on breast; immature are streaked with brown

Habitat:

- Deciduous, mixed and evergreen forests as well as deciduous areas of riparian habitat
- Can be tolerant of human disturbance in suburban areas

Food habits:

- Avian prey up to size of crow, but commonly more dove-sized
- Mammalian including mice and squirrels

Range:


- Breeding Range: United States, Southern Canada, and Northern Mexico
- Winters mostly in the U.S. and Mexico; also Costa Rica and Panama

Reproduction:

- Monogamous
- Nests as early as March
- Nest is generally made with sticks and lined with bark flakes
- Eggs are elliptical or sub-elliptical shaped, have a dirty white tinge and occasionally spotted
- Incubation, brooding and feeding mainly accomplished by the female

Threats:

- Habituation to humans and human impacts such as shooting or application of pesticides
- Predation by Great Horned Owls
- Timber harvests alter habitats and nesting areas

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Beneficial Management Practices:

- Prevent pollution and control or limit pesticide use
- Control habitat destruction by scheduling timber harvests during non-breeding seasons
- Limit human disturbance of nesting sites

LA River Basins:

Pearl, Pontchartrain, Mississippi, Barataria, Terrebonne, Vermilion-Teche, Calcasieu, Sabine, Red River
